#### ADDITIONS

Supervisor Croce stated that he had one addition for this evening's agenda.

##### 1. Request from Highway Superintendent:

Supervisor Croce read a memo from the Highway Superintendent asking for the Town Board to adopt the 2014 pay scale for the Highway Dept. employees. This new pay scale schedule was agreed upon by the Town Board in the adoption of the 2014 Town Budget.

\* Councilman Putnam made a motion to adopt the following 2014 pay scale schedule for the Town of Plattekill Highway Dept. employees; H.M.E.O. \$20.00 to \$24.00, M.E.O. \$18.00 to \$22.00, Mechanic/MEO \$18.00 to \$23.00, Working Supervisor \$25.75, Laborer \$11.25 and MW3 (520max) \$21.55.

Councilman Farrelly seconded.

On the vote: all ayes.

#### PUBLIC INPUT

Mrs. Sis Morse stated that she had two items this evening. The first thing she wanted to do was inform the Town Board that the Veteran's Committee would be holding their annual Valentine Dance on February 15, 2014 at the Elks Club on Rt. 32 in New Paltz. She will have more information as it becomes available.

Mrs. Morse stated that the second thing she wanted to do was thank Councilwoman Morano for all her time and effort that she put into being a member of the Town Board. Since this was her last regular Town Board meeting as a Councilmember, she gave her a bouquet of flowers and thanked her for taking on the duties of Councilmember and giving her opinions and ideas as part of the team that keeps the Town running smoothly. She stated that she will still be working with Ms. Morano as she is part of the Veteran's Committee and knows that she will stay active in our community.

Councilwoman Morano thanked Mrs. Morse for her comments and the flowers.

Mr. Stewart Smith stated that he had a petition that he was still obtaining signatures on, that he wanted to present to the Town Board to ask that the abandoned and run-down buildings throughout Town be taken down or fixed. He stated that these buildings have become eyesores and he wanted to bring this situation to the Town Board's attention.

Supervisor Croce asked if he had spoken with the Town Building Inspector about these buildings? He stated that he should start there as he is the one to make these types of determinations. He stated that there are certain regulations that have to be followed before a building is condemned. He stated that he remembers the Town tried to condemn a building that someone was living in, as it was in terrible condition and the Town Board received many comments suggesting that we were throwing this person out on to the street. His point to this is that there are building codes and regulations and these properties belong to someone. We can't just go on their property and make them take down their

buildings. He suggested again that he speak with the Building Inspector and alert him to the buildings that he is referring to.

Mr. Smith asked if having the petition would be helpful?

Supervisor Croce stated that it would probably be helpful if you have a large number of residents sign the petition, however the Building Inspector does have specific regulations and rules that he will have to follow in making his decisions.

Mr. Smith stated that he would contact the Building Inspector to make an appointment.

Mr. William Farrell, the Town Recreation Director, stated that he wanted the Town Board to know that much of the food that was collected and given to the Modena Methodist Church came from the Wallkill High School Seniors. He stated that they asked for donations and collected two large truck loads of food. He stated that there is still some available if anyone knows people who need some.

The Town Clerk stated that if anyone was aware of someone needing food, they should contact her office and she will make sure the Recreation Director receives an address to deliver the supplies.

Supervisor Croce and the rest of the Town Board thanked the students who were present in the room for collecting and donating all this food for needy residents in our Town.

Mr. Farrell stated that he also wanted to let the Town Board know that he is still a Trustee for the Library and he wanted them to know that the Library is looking into purchasing the old cider mill on Rt.32 in Modena for a new Library building. He stated that there were a lot of questions that still have to be answered, but he wanted to make sure the Town Board knew that they were looking to purchase the larger facility and they will be obtaining price quotes on renovating the building.

Councilman Farrelly asked how the Town would be paying for this?

Mrs. Morse stated that they have surplus money they want to use.

Mr. Farrell stated that the Library does have a building fund that they have set up for donations which does have some money in it, but we are also looking at doing a bond or obtaining State Grants. He stated that they are also working with the Rural Preservation Company in Kingston and they help communities do projects such as this. He stated that they were just in the very beginning stages of this project and they are doing a feasibility study.

Supervisor Croce asked again about money that has been set aside for this project.

Mr. Farrell stated yes, they have a building fund that has money that was donated to the Library.

Supervisor Croce stated that he was questioning this as he has never seen this included in the Library budget.

Mr. Farrell stated that the money in this building fund has all been donated.

Supervisor Croce stated that he felt they should provide a list of the donations that were made.

Mr. Farrell stated that they have asked "RUPCO" to give their opinion on using the building and to do an environmental and structural assessment of the building. If either fails, then the Library will not be able to do the project. There is a lot of work to be done on this.

There were no further comments or questions from the audience.

\* Supervisor Croce made a motion to close the Public Input Section of the meeting at 7:26 PM.

SECTION 1 – RECREATION DIRECTOR MONTHLY REPORT

Mr. Farrell reviewed several activities that the Town Recreation Dept. held over the past few months and reviewed what is planned for the next few months.

Mr. Farrell stated that the Senior Picnic was held at the Elks Club this year and 68 seniors attended. There were volunteers that helped to serve the food and many businesses donated the salads, hot dogs, hamburgers, baked beans and two six foot subs that were enjoyed for the meal. For dessert there was hot apple crisp and ice cream. There was live music and many nice prizes were given out by a raffle drawing. All the excess food was given out to the seniors to take home.

Mr. Farrell wanted to thank everyone who helped with their time or donated items. The event was put on totally by donations at no cost to the Town.

Mr. Farrell stated that he held the Halloween Parade at Hurds Farm again this year. Mrs. Hurd offered her facility at no cost to the Town residents and there were over 500 parents and children. Whole families came dressed in costume and went through the hiking trail, corn maze and were able to pick a pumpkin all free of charge. The Town supplied well over \$500.00 in candy and goodies.

Mr. Farrell wanted to thank Mrs. Susan Hurd and her staff for offering her facility and being very accommodating. Residents were able to make use of the entire farm and all its activities for the afternoon.

Supervisor Croce asked if Mr. Farrell had sent a thank you letter to Mrs. Hurd for her generosity?

Mr. Farrell stated that he had thanked her in person, but a letter would be nice.

Supervisor Croce stated that he would send a letter of thanks to her and also to the Elks Club for their generosity to the Town.

Mr. Farrell stated that the Fall Soccer program had 32 to 40 kids and we now have 35, 4-6 year olds enrolled in the indoor program. This program will run from November to March. He stated that there was also an outdoor program for kids aged 4 to 12 years old, which ran for 6 weeks and it taught fundamentals of soccer. A spring program is being scheduled to continue this one.

Mr. Farrell stated that on Tuesday nights he has a Skills & Drills Basketball program going on for kids in three age groups. The groups are for 7 to 9 year olds, 10 to 12 year olds and 13 to 15 year olds. The kids are taught the fundamentals of Basketball first and then they play in a game situation later. This gives the kids an idea of how to play and understand the game. He stated that the parents have expressed their approval of this program not only for the exercise and instruction, but for the fact that it is not driven by winning.

Mr. Farrell explained that he has been getting college kids to coach these programs through their Community Outreach programs and they all look forward to helping the kids play and understand the games.

Mr. Farrell stated that he would also be starting up the Adult Volley Ball games on Monday nights in January to spring time.

Mr. Farrell stated that he would like to thank the Town Board for showing their support of the Recreation Dept. He stated that he felt the Town Board understood the importance of these programs for our seniors and our youth.

Councilman Farrelly asked if these programs had a registration fee?

Mr. Farrell stated yes, and he is getting parents used to giving him checks or money orders only.

Mr. Farrell stated that he has also been in touch with the Senior Club and they are going to submit to him some trips that they would like to go on this year. He will then contact bus companies to get the best deals to as many of the trips as is possible. The idea is that they will suggest six trips and he will try to find busses for at least four of those trips.

The Town Board thanked him for this update.

#### SECTION 2 – POLICE MONTHLY REPORT – NOVEMBER 2013

Supervisor Croce stated that Chief Ryan could not be present this evening and had asked him to read the monthly report.

Supervisor Croce read that there were 383 documented calls for service during the month of November 2013. The total number of traffic tickets issued was 95 and there were 16 motor vehicle accidents with 6 persons reporting injuries.

Supervisor Croce did not read the arrest blotter as it was several pages long. He stated that the Detectives were working on a number of Burglary, Petit Larceny and Arson cases. One case of rape was closed with the person also arrested for burglary and a criminal sex act.

Supervisor Croce read that there were three vehicles that had some minor problems; Car 357 had a heater coil problem, Car 359 had a minor deer accident that needed some repair and Car 360 had a problem with the transmission.

Supervisor Croce stated that three letters were attached to this report. Two were for Officers, Matthew Walsh and Scott Wolpert, who have received commendations for Excellent Police Duty during the above mentioned rape case and Detective Zapata who received a commendation by being given the Chief Award for 2013 for his many arrests and convictions of burglars and drug dealers. Detective Zapata has also organized an annual Two Hand Touch Football Game between the Neighborhood Youth and the Police Dept. that is in its second year and the youths are already looking forward to next year's game. Supervisor Croce read the three letters, from the Police Chief, and these letters are attached to the minutes.

Supervisor Croce stated that these letters were read at the PBA annual award dinner and awards were given to these three Officers at that time. This shows the dedication that our Police Dept. has to the residents of this Town.

#### SECTION 3 – DOG CONTROL MONTHLY REPORT – NOVEMBER 2013

Councilman Putnam read the November Dog Control monthly report.

Councilman Putnam read that there were a total number of 16 calls taken for the month of November 2013 with 8 calls from the Plattekill PD and the Ulster County Sheriff's Dept. There are 3 cases still open, 2 dogs seized and/or impounded, 2 dogs were redeemed and one dog was adopted or rescued. There were no appearance tickets issued and there are currently no dogs in the kennel. There is one potential dangerous dog hearing under investigation and there are no cases in Town Court.

Councilman Putnam read that Mr. McKee was asking the Town Board to recognize Anne Verdi of 20 Fosler Road and to nominate her for "Citizen of the Year" as she went to great expense and invested herself in saving a stray dog which needed over \$1,000.00 in medical treatment. Mrs. Verdi paid Gardiner Animal Hospital to prepare the dog for transport to a second medical facility for a procedure and then sponsored the dog into an animal rescue where the dog will be found a home. And if that was not enough, Mrs. Verdi also paid the Town of Plattekill \$55.00 which was a portion of the expense for the dog's initial intake. As an animal lover, Mr. McKee further stated that he was happy there are people like Anne Verdi in our community who can turn an unfortunate tragedy into such a heartwarming success.

Supervisor Croce stated that he will make an effort to get this information to Mrs. Coppola, who is the Chairperson of the Citizen of the Year Committee.

Councilman DePew stated that he felt the Town should also send her a letter of thanks for all that she has done.

#### SECTION 4 – BUILDING DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT

Councilman Farrelly read the November 2013 monthly report from the Building Dept.

Councilman Farrelly read that there were 31 Field Inspections done, no Stop Work Orders issued, 6 Violations issued, 1 Violation Closed, 3 Court Cases on-going with the next court appearance date of Dec. 13, 2013 – but these were adjourned, 1 Court Case that is being moved to another Town, 4 Complaints taken, no Structure Fires reported, 4 Building Permits issued, no Certificates of Occupancy issued, 1 Certificate of Compliance issued and 12 Municipal Searches done.

Supervisor Croce stated that he thought the adjournment of the Court Cases was due to the Building Inspector being away for a few weeks to teach a class. The cases will probably be rescheduled as soon as he returns to work here.

#### SECTION 5 – TRANSFER STATION

Supervisor Croce stated that the Town Transfer Station is approximately \$8,000.00 in the red. He stated that he had given the Town Board a spread sheet that was put together by the Town Clerk in the Town of Ulster which showed how all the Transfer Stations in the County are run. He felt that the Town of Plattekill fees fell somewhere in the middle of what everyone else was charging. Some charged for stickers, others don't, but they charge more, or less, for other items.

Councilman DePew stated that he would like to hold off on making any decisions at this time and do some more research. He would like to know if this has been about the same as in other years or whether we got less revenue, or more revenue, than in previous years.

Councilman Farrelly asked if we were to sell stickers, how much would it help? Maybe we could change the cost of the coupons.

The Town Clerk stated that the coupons are just exchanged for dollar bills. They are used at the Transfer Station as a dollar bill would be used. If a bag of garbage is three dollars, then they pay with three coupons.

Councilman DePew stated that he still felt this needed more research.

Councilman Putnam asked if the Town was being charged to remove the tires at the Transfer Station?

Supervisor Croce stated that we do charge to take tires and the Highway Clerk, Linda Byrnes, has found a separate company that comes and takes them for less than what we were paying in the past. He stated that the electronics recycling company was also here today and they have taken all the electronic waste that we had. He stated that they left fliers with us to show how to stack the waste and shrink wrap it. What we gave them today was not stacked appropriately, but they did not charge us to take it.

There was a short discussion that maybe the fee schedule should be adjusted. The Town Board will be reviewing the current schedule and doing more research.

#### SECTION 6 – CORNERSTONE - TELEPHONE AGREEMENT

Supervisor Croce introduced Kate Dietrich, who is a representative from the CornerStone Phone Company. This is the Company the Town uses instead of Verizon for service throughout the Town facilities.

Ms. Dietrich explained to the Town Board that CornerStone was asking the Town to sign a three year agreement and there was a suggestion to lower the cost the Town pays monthly. She explained that most land-lines, the general phone lines, are copper lines and these cost more than using lines that the Cablevision Company uses. She also stated that the copper lines are getting old and when they get wet, it causes a lot of static, which is something that has plagued the Town Hall phones for years. She was suggesting that most of the copper lines be changed over to cable lines. She stated that she could put one phone line in each bundle on a switch that would automatically change it back to a copper line if the cable went out. This way we would still have at least one phone line that would work. The cable line does not go out very often and this would be a fail-safe if it were to go out. She stated that the Police lines would stay on copper at this time and not be changed over to the cable lines.

Councilman DePew asked if there would be any problems with the switching station in Clintondale if we changed the lines to cable.

Ms. Dietrich stated that she did not think there would be a problem; however she would look into it. She stated that CornerStone would still do all the billing for the phones, just as they do currently. It is just that the copper lines are getting old and static on the lines is caused by moisture getting to the copper. She stated that the internal phone system (the Avaya System) is also getting old and if the Town were to get a new digital system, phone costs would also go down.

Mr. Smith, a resident in the audience, asked if there was a backup generator for phone lines?

Supervisor Croce explained to him that the Town Hall had had a problem a few months ago and all the phones in the Town Hall were not working properly. Calls were being diverted to the wrong

departments and some of the lines were not working. CornerStone stepped in and helped us by rolling over calls from one line to another until we got the problem taken care of. At this time we also purchased a backup system.

Mr. Smith asked if there was a contractual obligation with this change in the phone service?

Ms. Dietrich stated that there was a three year contract that the Town Board was asked to sign off on. She stated that she would meet with the Supervisor to go over the lines and each group of lines could have a copper line to fall back on if the cable was to go out. She explained that this could be done after the contract was signed.

Councilman DePew questioned that the paperwork he was looking at showed the Town would be paying some "tax". The Town does not pay tax.

Ms. Dietrich explained that these taxes were not sales tax and the Town would be paying for these taxes.

Councilman Farrelly asked if there was a benefit to the Town for signing a 3-year contract?

Ms. Dietrich stated that there was not much of a difference, but if the Town should purchase a new phone system, there are some other things that could change to make the bills go down a little.

Supervisor Croce asked, so if we go with a three year contract and we want to change things in 2 years, there are no consequences?

Ms. Dietrich stated no, the contract was just an agreement with CornerStone to use their company.

\* Councilman DePew made a motion to enter into a (1) one year agreement with CornerStone for the phone service for the Town of Plattekill.

Councilman Putnam seconded.

On the vote: all ayes.

#### SECTION 7 – EMPLOYEE HANDBOOK

Supervisor Croce stated that the Employee Handbook has not been updated in quite some time and new decisions have been made by the Town Board that are not printed in the Employee Handbook. He would like to suggest that the Town Board review the handbook and add in what is missing. He stated that there are also some situations that have come up over the past few years that the handbook does not cover. He stated that he felt it would be in the best interest of the Town to go through the handbook and see what might need to be updated.

Supervisor Croce stated that he would like to suggest that the Town Board use Mr. Wallens, the Attorney who has helped to negotiate the Town Union Contracts (Town Hall employees and Police).

Councilman DePew stated that he was in agreement with using Mr. Wallens; however he felt that the Town Board should review the handbook and make a list of items that we feel need to be modified. Then we can give Mr. Wallens this list. He did not feel the Town Board should ask Mr. Wallens to go through the handbook to re-write it.

Supervisor Croce stated that he agreed with Councilman DePew. He was suggesting that we use Mr. Wallens for some of the situations that have come up recently. We have to make sure of how to deal with these issues.

Councilman DePew asked if there was any value in sending a memo to the Departments to see what issues they may have?

Supervisor Croce stated that he did not think this should be done in the beginning of the process. The book is a Town Board document and he feels the Town Board should propose some changes and then the Departments can review the changes and make their comments.

Councilman Putnam suggested that the Supervisor start to make a list of the issues that he has seen as a problem. Then the Town Board can meet to discuss them. Then if we need Mr. Wallens, we can contact him at that time.

Supervisor Croce stated yes, that was what he wanted to do. He stated that he also wanted to contact area Towns to obtain a copy of their employee handbooks to see how they deal with certain situations.

Councilman Farrelly stated that he realizes there have been some decisions made by the previous Town Boards that have to be added to the handbook, but he believes the vast majority of the book is good.

Councilman DePew stated again that he is in favor of making a list and identifying what the issues are before contacting Mr. Wallens.

Supervisor Croce stated that he agreed. We do not want Mr. Wallens to take the lead on this. We don't want him to suggest changes to us. He stated that he just doesn't want anyone thinking that the Town Board is doing anything behind closed doors.

#### SECTION 8 – WALLKILL HIGH SCHOOL –TALENTED & GIFTED PROJECT

Supervisor Croce explained that there was a group of students from the Wallkill High School here this evening to make a proposal to the Town Board.

A student named Jonathan spoke for the group explaining that they were all students in a Talented and Gifted Program. One of their assignments was to propose a project and their teacher who oversees this program has suggested that they look into making a dog park for the Town of Plattekill.

Jonathan explained that their instructor is a dog lover and often goes to the dog park in the Town of Gardiner. Another dog park in the area would be nice. He stated that they would be using the suggestions put out by the American Kennel Club for setting up the dog park.

Supervisor Croce asked if they had decided on a location?

Jonathan stated that the location would be specified in the proposal. What they were looking for this evening was whether the Town was interested in having them put together a proposal for this use.

Councilman DePew stated that he had some concerns. He stated that he would want to know who would fund and take care of this park after it is completed; also that there would be sanitary concerns.

Jonathan stated that these were concerns that would be covered in the proposal, but they were here tonight to see if the Town Board had any other concerns that they had not thought of. He stated that the students were interested in having a meeting with the Town Board to discuss other concerns.

The Town Board was in agreement that the Town Board Meeting forum was best. They did not need to have a special meeting with the students.

Supervisor Croce asked if they wanted to meet with just two members of the Town Board as this was easier to set up than a Special Town Board Meeting.

Jonathan stated that he was not sure and agreed to come back to a future Town Board Meeting to speak with the whole Town Board.

Supervisor Croce reminded them that "Government works slowly" and the Town Board will need to consider everything about this project. He suggested that they give him a call when they were ready to come back to a Town Board Meeting and he would put them on the agenda.

Councilman DePew stated that the Town Board was neither for this project nor against it. He wanted to make sure they understood that the decision would be made after the proposal had been reviewed by the Town Board.

There was some more discussion on where the dog park could be located.

One of the other students stated that they felt it should be near the current Thomas Felten Park and that they would need about an acre and a half of property.

Supervisor Croce stated that he has some reservations about a dog park as he could see some dogs not getting along with others. He stated that he has visions of a large Doberman eating some senior citizen's little shih tzu.

Jonathan stated that he understands there is a concern about dog violence, but he feels that having a park can reduce the incidences of dog violence. If the dogs can have space to run around, they will be much happier and they can play together. They will include this topic in their proposal.

Councilman Farrelly stated that he has a concern about people being bitten by dogs. They are on Town property and the Town could be held liable. This is something else that must be looked at.

Councilman DePew stated that his major concerns were insurance, who will be maintaining the dog park, the real cost to maintain it and controlling the violence that could occur.

Jonathan stated that he felt that they could post a sign that states the dog owner is responsible for his dog's behavior. The group will have to research all of this.

Jonathan stated that he wanted to let the Town Board know that there was a person, who was not a part of their group, that was looking to do an Eagle Scout project. It has been proposed that maybe this person could build the dog park as a co-operative project for their Eagle Scout project. Nothing has been finalized as yet.

Several members of the Town Board felt that this would not work as an Eagle Scout project because Eagle Scouts are supposed to plan, fundraise and build their own project.

Supervisor Croce stated that he wanted to thank the group for coming in this evening and he wanted to let them know that the Highway Superintendent, Mr. Robert Wager, is also in charge of Buildings & Grounds, which includes the Park. If they have any questions, he may be the one to get answers from.

Councilman Putnam stated that if the group lets the Town Board know when they are coming back, we can inform Mr. Wager so he can be here too.

Supervisor Croce asked if any of the students in the group actually lived in Plattekill?

Jonathan stated yes, but they could not be here this evening.

Supervisor Croce informed them that the next regular Town Board Meeting will be on January 15<sup>th</sup> if they would like to ask more questions or are ready with their proposal.

SECTION 8 – TRANSFERS

\* Supervisor Croce made a motion to transfer \$2,500.00 from the Highway Fund Budget Line item #DA5110.100 Highway Dept. General Repairs Personnel to Highway Fund Budget Line item #DA5142.100 Snow Removal Personnel to cover the overage of this account due to overtime from the last snowstorm. A copy of this complete transfer is attached to these minutes.

Councilman Putnam seconded.

On the vote: all ayes.

\* Supervisor Croce made a motion to transfer \$5,000.00 from the Highway Fund Budget Line item #DA5110.4 Highway Dept. General Repairs Contractual to Highway Fund Budget Line item #DA5130.4 Machinery Contractual to cover any unforeseen repairs to the machinery for the remainder of 2013. A copy of the complete transfer is attached to these minutes.

Councilwoman Morano seconded.

On the vote: all ayes.

At this time, Supervisor Croce stated that he wanted to thank Councilwoman Morano for her time that she has been a part of the Town Board. She brought a different and interesting incite to our discussions and the decisions that we have made. He wanted her to know that she will be missed.

Mrs. Morse added that she is a great asset to this Town as she has volunteered her time helping wherever she is needed.

SECTION 9 – VOUCHERS

\* Councilman DePew made a motion to pay the Voucher Detail Report dated 12/18/2013, which includes the General Fund Amount of \$11,800.13, the Highway Fund amount of \$9,786.44 and the Trust and Agency amount of \$3,344.55 for a total amount of \$24,931.12 recognizing that the Audit Committee has reviewed the claims and found them acceptable for payment.

Councilman Putnam seconded.
